

Mark Williams (Clayton 1973)

Mark Williams (Clayton 1973), was selected to represent South Africa at the Paris 2024 Paralympics as an assistant to one of our Paralympic cyclists - Pieter du Preez (H1 Class Handcycle). Pieter is a C6 Quadriplegic. Mark has worked with Pieter for the past seven years.

Pieter, accompanied by Mark, competed in the H1 Individual Time Trial on 4 September at the Paralympics and won a Bronze Medal for Team South Africa.

Mark is a master bike fitter and conditioning coach and is based in East London.

Nick Huddy (Clayton 1999)

Nick Huddy (Clayton 1999) has partnered with giga-programme management software "Integrate" to lead "The Ambitious Machine Challenge" - a first-of-its-kind project that is working with NASA and other organisations to digitally recreate the entire programme life cycle of the International Space Station.

The project was launched at Space Vision 2024 in collaboration with SEDS (Students for the Exploration and Development of Space), and brings together students from universities across the USA including Harvard, MIT, and Columbia to piece together 26 years of data from five space agencies, thousands of engineers, and suppliers from 15 countries. They will be guided by specialists who were involved in the build of the ISS to ensure historical accuracy.

The objective is to not only preserve the historic record of space exploration, but to create a learning tool that will be used to build a better roadmap for how these giga-programmes are undertaken in the future. Being able to see the entire lifecycle in a single, compact, and manageable view will allow space developers to identify exactly where bottlenecks and errors have previously emerged, and how to avoid them in the future, saving potentially hundreds of millions of dollars and improving the safety of personnel on the ground and in orbit. It will be included in the syllabus of many of the schools' aerospace and engineering programmes starting in 2026.

Nick is the co-founder and executive creative director of Hudson Davis Communications - a Los Angeles-based public relations and creative consulting firm that specialises in lateral growth solutions for SMEs. He is also deeply involved in the entertainment industry, and in 2022 was presented a SOVAS Award for his work in animation.

Remembrance Day 2024

Old Johannians, St John's College students and staff gathered in The Memorial Chapel for our annual Remembrance Day Mass, honouring the lives and sacrifices of those who have served in wars past and present.

The haunting sounds of "The Last Post", performed by Jason Aspoas (LV Clarke), filled the chapel from the choir gallery, followed by the laying of the wreath by Siza Gule (Head of School) in memory of those who gave their lives for greater peace. After a moment's silence, "The Rouse", also performed by Aspoas, brought the solemn tribute to a close.

The music of the Solemn Mass included "Libera me and Pie Jesu" from Gabriel Fauré's "Requiem", performed by the 110-strong Chapel Choir, with soloists Tirivashe Pasipanodya (LIV Nash) and Benjamin Anderson (UIII). The "Kontakion for the Departed" was sung during the concluding rites, and the liturgy ended with an organ postlude by Anton Bruckner.









IN MEMORIAM

John David Hadfield (Hill 1944)



13 May 1927 - 5 November 2024

St John's College announced with great sadness the passing of our oldest Old Johannian, John David (Jack) Hadfield. Jack passed away early on Tuesday morning, 5 November 2024, eighty years after he had matriculated from the College.

Jack Hadfield was at school during the tough World War II years when South African society became aware of social problems in Johannesburg and the rest of the country.

After Trevor Huddleston visited St John's and addressed the boys, Jack heard the CR priest's call for help. Together with three other boys, he took over teaching at the 'Native Night School', teaching English and Mathematics. Jack Hadfield was the last surviving member of this 1940s venture, which provided education for township boys who were unable to attend school.

It is with deep sadness that the sudden passing of John Wilder, an exemplary Old Johannian, is recorded. The St John's College Community has lost a stalwart advocate for the cohesion and communication of Old Johannians in the cause of a better world, particularly in the United States of America.

John entered the College in 1959 and was in Hill House until he moved to Clayton for his Sixth Form year. During that year, he was appointed a Monitor. John participated in sports and played for the Sixth Rugby team. John Wilder was named as an individualist and original thinker by a former teacher who remembers him well. John became the founder chairman of the College Film Society, which he served for many years. He filled several roles in the annual Shakespeare plays. He also served as an assistant librarian for several years.
