

Attended by over 50 Old Johannians and held in the Common Room, a space traditionally reserved only for teachers, the high tea was a memorable morning of reminiscing, reconnecting and celebrating the shared experiences and successes that shaped the lives of those who walked the St John's corridors.

Eminent Speaker Breakfast Series

The OJA hosted three Eminent Speaker Breakfasts in the first part of 2024. Each presentation provided a deep understanding of complex issues and current trends and was followed by conversation, networking opportunities and breakfast at The Old Johannian Club.

Vice-Chancellor and Principal of Wits, Prof. Zeblon Vilakazi, opened the series in January with an inspired and inspiring presentation that considered the value and impact of technology and AI on teaching, learning and innovation. His brilliant talk was both informative and refreshingly accessible, encouraging critical thought around the role of technology and how it will shape our lives.

In May, a full auditorium welcomed Dr Frans Cronje (Thomson 1995) to hear his political and economic observations and predictions for South Africa, just ahead of this year's critical national election. By outlining defining factors and how these may affect our country's immediate future, Frans's analytical and data-driven address identified possible trajectories.

Esteemed economist and speaker, Ronak Gopaldas (Thomson 2004), led a dynamic post-election discussion in June. In conversation with Sam Mkokeli (Mkokeli Advisory), Lukhona Mnguni (Rivonia Circle) and Mpho Molopyane (Alexforbes), Ronak shared invaluable insights into how various political scenarios for South Africa may impact the economy and markets.

1972 Old Johannian reunion at St John's College on Gaudy Day

The overdue 50th reunion commenced at 07h00 on Friday the 12th of July with a welcome assembly by the headmaster and boys in the amphitheatre which took us back to our Thursdays when Deanne Yates reminded those of us with sideburns that we should 'eliminate the facial hair on the vertical side of the cranium'. We then moved to scones and coffee in the David Quad, followed by a tour of the Heritage Museum. Breakfast that followed at The Old Johannian Club, was attended by old boys and their wives. The paucity of attendees from '72 was adequately compensated by the conviviality and enthusiasm of reformed friendships. The Executive Headmaster Stuart West, retired masters Mick Badham and Cliff Midgley together with the Head of Council, Thulani Khanyile and the Chairman of the St John's OJA Graham Kerr-Phillips were present. I thanked these two amazing, dedicated, brilliant teachers who have devoted their lives to boys like us, instilling a value system and code of conduct which has assisted all of us in achieving our goals.

I made a brief welcoming speech to thank the headmaster and the other senior members of the College community who joined us and my immediate impression was that the school is in extremely good hands under the leadership of Stuart, a great headmaster. It was rather strange to be in the company of a headmaster when some 55 years ago my abiding memory of our then headmaster was one of abject terror.

Some who attended had travelled from afar: Dave Ellington; Mark Goodale (and wife Norma); and Richard Snell from the UK; and some out-of-towners Steven Voget; Gavin Routledge; Rupert Worsdale (and wife Liz); Adam Langbridge (and wife Jean) and James Bourhill (and wife Jackie) together with Anthony Hare; Michael Davies (and wife Glenda); Graeme King; Rob Newsome; and Henry Adams together with my own wife Liz Woolford.

We enjoyed an interesting tour of the school with many new additions such as a new aquatic centre which was close to my heart as my own son Myles Woolford played first team water polo in upper 4, lower 5 and Matric and played for Gauteng. They were regarded as one of the greatest teams in St John's history, having lost only 7 games in 8 years as a team.

On Gaudy Day, we visited the Heritage Exhibition which captured the history of the school since its founding by the Community of the Resurrection in 1898 up to the present date. This was followed by the lavish Adsum Tea and then onto rugby between the first team at the school leavers, and lunch with the headmaster in very relaxed surroundings under a marquee on Burger Field.

The usual Friday night before Gaudy Day dinner was in fact not at all usual but spectacular in terms of the décor, speeches and fare with the traditional Boar's Head Carol followed by deeply inspirational speeches. The 2007 Headboy, Melvyn

Lubega, spoke with the confidence that made me proud to be called a Johannian alongside him.

The highlight I think for me of the entire visit apart from reconnecting with all my old mates was the Chapel service which brought many tears to many eyes as the St John's choir excelled themselves. The music will remain in us forever.

Overall, it was a wonderful time to share our stories and to remind ourselves of the incredible privilege that we all enjoyed as part of one of the greatest educational institutions on earth! 





GOLDEN EAGLE AWARD 2024

WHERE IN THE WORLD ARE OUR OJs?

Good Fellowship

Going back eight decades, I was a fast-growing tangle of arms and legs, with no sporting talent. There was a cup for Good Fellowship, but I didn't win that either. Five decades later, my dad was enjoying his retirement and in what turned out to be his ultimate year, we would occasionally have sundowners together and he would reminisce about the variety of my successful activities. He asked me whether there was anything that I had wanted to do or had tried to do and was unsuccessful. I told him that he would have to go back to my King Edward Preparatory school days, where I wanted to win the Good Fellowship Cup. He laughed and said that I didn't have a hope, as he had donated the cup to the school with the obvious understanding that I would never receive it. Having lived for five decades with the idea of a Good Fellowship Cup, it seemed appropriate when my grandson Luke entered St John's Pre-Preparatory School, that I would introduce a Good Fellowship Award, but I decided that it would be an actual award and not a cup, and that the award should be clearly defined in a preamble describing the St Johns Preparatory School Boy who behaves according to the following:

- a. shows commitment to concerned and correct interpersonal behaviour without regard for the popularity or otherwise of his decisions
- b. unconditionally cares for all fellow scholars, especially those apparently less fortunate than himself
- c. unselfishly gives of his time, talents and ability to help others, either as individuals or as a group, to achieve their aspirations and goals
- d. shows a willingness and ability to identify problems being experienced by others or himself, and thus facilitates resolutions of the problems
- e. appreciates and reciprocates the benefits he experiences because of the unselfish behaviour of others
- f. sees himself as a modest member of the winning team consisting of students, teachers and school staff, upholding the precept of "Lux Vita Caritas"
- g. shares the fun and enjoyment of being a schoolboy while endeavouring to meet the commitments outlined above

When I showed this pre-amble to the remarkably talented teachers, Mrs Helen Popplewell (retired Headmistress of St John's Pre-Preparatory School), she said that this is more than Good Fellowship, it absorbs the total ethos of the school, and should therefore be called the *Lux Vita Caritas* Award.

Tales of Two Countries

Ray Dearlove (Hill 1965) published his second book "Tales of Two Countries" after "The Crash of Rhinos".

It describes a childhood in apartheid-era South Africa and the turbulent years before Nelson Mandela assumed the presidency in 1994. Having lived in Australia for more than thirty years has brought its own share of interesting people, events and opportunities. There are many stories about the

raw challenges of moving countries. Quoting Rod Morrison, one of Australia's pre-eminent publishers, "Ray's book has some very moving and also some very humorous moments, all told in Ray's discerning and direct style."

Tony Park, bestselling author of many novels set in Africa, the "Muscles from Brussels" Jean-Claude van Damme and Adrian Gardiner, one of Africa's best known entrepreneurs and conservationists have kindly written forewords for the book. Tony commented, "An insightful conversation starter for any barbie or braai."

IN MEMORIAM

Adrian Philip Nicholas Walton (Head of School, Nash 1984)



The Old Johannian community was saddened to hear of the passing of an exemplary Johannian, Adrian Walton, who was Head of School in 1984. Adrian succumbed to his battle with cancer at a relatively early age on 3 July 2024. He was 57 years old.

Adrian was born in Nairobi on 3 May 1967. His family moved to Johannesburg in 1971, and in 1973, Adrian joined the Pre-Prep and went on to become a Pre-Prep survivor when he left the College in 1984. As a schoolboy, Adrian was the epitome of a worthy Johannian. His impressive achievements in sports and cultural events were numerous. *Read more...*

David Hatherly Matthews (Nash 1954)



With David Matthews's death on 26 April 2024, Southern Africa has lost a great pioneer in post-apartheid education.

David was born on 12 February 1936 and entered St John's Preparatory in 1944, where he was affectionately known as 'Doggie' to his friends. David had an exceptional career in the College where he achieved mathematics distinctions year upon year and was an allrounder on the sports fields. He played rugby for the First XV, often scoring penalties and converting tries. He also played cricket for the Second XI and excelled in athletics, coming first in the high jump, hurdles, and discus throw. Read more...

Hugh Henry Huggett (Nash 1958)



St John's College has suffered a grave loss of a revered Johannian with the death of Hugh Henry Huggett, an education activist and, throughout his life, a man who followed the principle of Ubuntu in his varied and memorable career and in all that he had done.

Hugh was born into a St John's College family and was the son of the famous Jack Huggett, a successful teacher and Officer Commanding of the St John's College Cadet detachment.

Our winter sports season ended on Saturday with the highly anticipated 7th annual Pink Derby Day, where our young men faced St Stithians College in hockey and rugby in support of gendered cancers and the PinkDrive

St John's took on a rosy pink glow as supporters from both schools dressed in pink to support Pink Derby Day. Trees were swathed in pink cloth, and pink goodies were sold throughout the day. There was also a raffle to raise funds for the Pink Drive, who were on-site with their mobile screening clinic. This year, we introduced the Wall of Hope at the entrance to St John's College, where, for a donation, community members from both schools could leave messages for loved ones touched by cancer.

The main hockey game on Saturday featured the 2nd XI in pink socks, who unfortunately lost 4-2. Overall, both schools claimed six victories each, with a single draw. The 1st XI match took place on Monday evening, where they narrowly lost 3-2 after fighting back from a 3-0 deficit in an exciting fixture.

In rugby, the results tipped in favour of St John's College. The Blues clinched a nail-biting, last-gasp 24-20 win on Burger Field in their pink socks. The U16As drew 22-22, the U15As enjoyed a 12-10 victory, and the U14A side suffered a 10-12 loss. The U15B, 3rd, and 4th teams ended the season well with some good wins.

The History of the Pink Derby Day

In 2013, Alex Kuttschreuter (Thomson 2013), who was then in matric, approached Mr Martin Huysamer, Deputy Head, Student Affairs, to sell pink ribbons to the students at St John's to raise awareness and funds for the oncology unit at a local hospital. He and his brother, Luke Kuttschreuter (Thomson 2008), had lost their mom to cancer a few years earlier. From these humble beginnings and after much brainstorming and tweaking over the next few years, the idea of a Pink Derby Day was established to raise awareness around breast cancer. Annual collections to support this cause achieved varied degrees of success until St John's teamed up with St Mary's School to co-host a CANSA Relay for Life, where more than R500 000 was raised.

The first fully-fledged Pink Derby against St Stithians Boys' College happened in 2016. We also teamed up with The Pink Drive organisation, which provides free support and counselling services to women across South Africa, to raise funds through various initiatives on the day. These initiatives include selling pink roses and pink cupcakes to spectators and supporting the merchandise sold at the Pink Drive stall.

In 2018, St Stithians agreed to reciprocate by dedicating this fixture to this important cause. The impact of having two great boys' schools in Johannesburg support women's health at their annual derby fixture goes a long way to heightening awareness and encouraging early detection that can potentially save lives.
